Partnership in Youth Services (Grant award: \$3,000)

Application opened June 15, 2022, and closes August 15, 2022 Note: PYS applications do not require a Letter of Inquiry (LOI) before starting a full application.

Bucks Innovation & Improvement (BIIG) (Grant awards up to \$15,000)

LOIs are due no later than October 1, 2022. Following an LOI meeting with FCP, full applications are due no later than October 15, 2022.

Capital Improvement (Grant awards up to \$10,000)

LOIs are due no later than October 1, 2022. Following an LOI meeting with FCP, full applications are due no later than October 15, 2022.

Foundations Community Partnership (FCP) was formed in July 2007, as a result of the sale of Foundations Behavioral Health. FCP is a philanthropic grant-making foundation supporting the behavioral health and human service needs of children, young adults, and families in Bucks County, Pa. FCP provides grants and technical assistance to nonprofit organizations, awards scholarships to Bucks County high school seniors, subsidizes service learning internships for college students, underwrites community education programs and supports behavioral health education.

NONPROFIT GROWTH GRANTS LAUNCHED

FCP continues to invest in the organizational and professional development needs of Bucks County nonprofits through its newly launched Nonprofit Growth Grants (NGG). NGG are offered in two tracks: Organizational Development, for organization-level training and planning, and Professional Development, designed to support nonprofit professionals in their career growth.

Organizational development opportunities include board training, executive and custom coaching, financial planning, and strategic and succession planning.

Professional development opportunities include Master of Science in Nonprofit Leadership tuition assistance, Certificate in Nonprofit Management tuition assistance, Diversity, Equity

& Inclusion training tuition assistance, and workshop and conference scholarships

BUCKS COLLEGE STUDENTS SPEND THE SUMMER SERVING THEIR COMMUNITIES

Nine college students from Bucks County participated in FCP's 2022 Summer Youth Corps (SYC) program, which offers paid internships at local non-profit human service agencies serving children, youth, and families. The students gain meaningful, practical experience while community nonprofits benefit from motivated, bright college students bringing helping hands to their organization.

Since its inception in 2007, the SYC program has placed 191 interns in 38 non-profit agencies in the County over 15 summers. Collectively, these interns contributed more than 52,000 service hours.

FORMER SYC INTERN COMES FULL CIRCLE



My name is Amanosi Agbugui, and I'm this year's Graduate Field Supervisor for the Summer Youth Corps program (SYC). Spending this summer with the SYC has brought me full circle, as I served as an intern in 2018 at the YWCA of Bucks County. That was an enriching experience for me, and I am thrilled to offer this year's interns support and supervision as they navigate through their internships.

Since my SYC summer in 2018, I earned my bachelor's degree in psychology from West Chester University, and I recently completed my first year in the Doctor of Psychology in Clinical Psychology program at William Paterson University of NJ.

As the Field Supervisor, I oversee and provide individual supervision with the interns and their supervisors at their respective agencies every week to ensure they are achieving their personal and agency goals. When individual supervision is not taking place, I assist FCP with program related marketing on the social media platforms.

During the weekly in-house day for interns, I co-facilitate group supervision with Dr. Dan Weldon as the interns reflect and share their experiences at their host agencies that week. The time is spent in discussion about their accomplishments and encountered challenges, providing problem solving strategies, as well as exploring thematic topics to stimulate discussion among the interns.

I also provide support for the academic component of the program, led by Deborah Sedik, associate professor at Bucks County Community College. This aspect of the summer engages the interns to read various articles regarding professionalism, ethics, human development, personality assessments, and much more. Every week, the interns are prepared to exchange viewpoints on the academic readings and its application to their work at their agencies.

During the 10-week period, each agency hosts all the interns to highlight the work they do. These "field trips" afford the interns the opportunity to learn more about how other non-profit organizations operate and serve the Bucks County community.

I thoroughly enjoyed my experience when I was an intern and now have a greater appreciation for FCP and the various host agencies since serving as the graduate supervisor. This is truly a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that cultivates professional development, understanding of non-profit organizations, service learning, and personal growth. From the perspective of the graduate supervisor, it has been a lovely full-circle moment to support the interns and bear witness to the impact the agencies are having on them, as well as the impact they are contributing to the community. The success of the summer is attributable to the intentional efforts of the interns, FCP and host agencies, and I am proud to be a part of this amazing program.
